Kyle Fleming is a certified Music Therapist with a 4-year degree and a minor in Phycology. Music can help in many areas. Kyle works in hospice for help with pain management and works with traumatized children to help



them relax and learn to cope with the things that happened in their lives. Music helps build connections and singing helps people cope. One child had 7-8 major bad experiences growing up so he was over the top on the "at risk" scale. He couldn't talk about the things that happened so he would explode with anger and frustration. While listening to one song, he wrote a three-page letter to his mother saying how mad and hurt he was by her actions. This opened the floodgates and he was eventually able to heal. Kyle played his guitar and we sang about some of our problems and possible solutions. Music helps!

The Danville Chapter, in collaboration with Danville businesses, decided to do something about non-handicapped people parking in handicap spaces. They came up with the idea of putting pictures of handicapped people on the signs in the parking lots. They added a catch phrase, "Think of me and keep it free." This has been very successful, with businesses reporting that cars will pull into the spaces but then pull back out. The signs started out as fiber board but those became damaged so they moved to metal signs at a higher cost but will last longer. They had fundraisers and raised \$12,000 of which \$5,000 has been spent on materials. They would like to place another 100 signs in Danville and possibly Urbana and Champaign.
